2023 WRAP Speakers and Sessions

Session 1: Amy Laughlin: Intergenerational Leadership: Recruiting, Retaining & Recognizing Multiple Generations in the Workplace

Bio: Amy Laughlin, CRCFA, ADC, CDP graduated from the University of Leeds in England with a degree in Sociology and Social Policy and moved to the USA in 2002 to follow her heart and marry a charming southern gentleman. She began working in the field of activities as a volunteer 18 years ago and quickly discovered the joy associated with educating, empowering and energizing senior adults. Amy is experienced in providing leadership and operations management for Independent Living, Assisted Living, Skilled Nursing and Home Care, and currently holds the position of Director of Residential Life for the Presbyterian Communities of South Carolina. She is a former Board member for the South Carolina Activity Professionals Association, and was proud to serve as President of the National Association of Activity Professionals for three years. She is a licensed Administrator, nationally credentialed through NCCAP and was awarded the South Carolina Activity Professional of the Year in 2014. She is a guest instructor for Winthrop University's Department of Sociology and Anthropology and has presented workshops across the nation for activity professionals, senior living providers, healthcare professionals and groups of active seniors. She is a group fitness instructor, and former playwright, choreographer and director of a theater company composed entirely of seniors. Amy is an aspiring minimalist and seeker of a simpler life. She loves to exercise, read, write, cook and spend time with her chosen few.

Session description: There are currently four, or perhaps even five, generations working in today's senior living communities. This session will identify the defining characteristics of each generation, plus their sentinel life events and significant societal and cultural values. The primary and secondary motivations of each generation will be discussed to establish understanding of what drives each group to work – or not work – for themselves and for the good of the team. Successful strategies for recruiting and retaining each generation will be shared as well as ways to use the generational differences as advantages when assigning job tasks and asking your team members to go above and beyond.

- 1. Have a basic understanding of the generations currently in the workforce.
- 2. Recognize what drives each of these generations to be productive and content.
- 3. Possess strategies to effective lead multiple generations on a team.

Session 2: Elizabeth Lewis- Coping with Compassion Fatigue

Bio: Elizabeth Lewis is a grief support specialist, stress resilience trainer, spiritual counselor and motivational speaker whose areas of expertise include trauma healing, suicide prevention, forgiveness facilitation, and healing art and writing. Recognizing that there is no "one-size-fits-all" path to wellness and a sense of wholeness, Elizabeth has pursued extensive training and certifications in diverse approaches to resilience, spirituality, healing and growth. Elizabeth also draws on her personal resilience and experience in overcoming trauma to help her clients find their own best path to healing.

Session description: Compassion fatigue is a form of caregiver burnout, manifesting in deep physical, emotional and spiritual exhaustion related to care-giving for others. In this workshop, we will explore: the causes, signs and symptoms of compassion fatigue, how to develop a self-care action plan; and strategies and tools for coping for renewal.

Learning Objective:

- Create awareness of the causes, signs and symptoms of compassion fatigue.
- Learn strategies and tools for coping and renewal.
- Develop a self-care action plan.

Session 3: Terri Bartlett- Creative Writing

Bio: Terri Bartlett is a retired former Activity Director of 40 plus years in Illinois and Wisconsin. She was a Play Skills Group Leader and Supervisor at Glenwood State Hospital and School in Iowa, NCAP Regional Representative, WRAP Public Relations and Strategic Planning Chair as well as a previous conference speaker for WRAP, NAAP and the Alzheimer's Association. She is currently enjoying free time, traveling, relationships, writing, creating and being a part time storyteller "The Gypsy Spirit".

Session description: This session will share how to build a resident creative writing group. You'll have fun with hands on exercises that can be incorporated not only in the group, but in your own creative writing. Ideas to get unstuck will also be shared.

- 1. You will learn how to start or build on a creative writing group
- 2. You will learn different ways to support all participants involvement
- 3. You will learn exercises to bring back to your group

Session 4: Amy Laughlin: Life With Purpose: Implementing Vocational Wellness Initiatives

Session description: Many senior living organizations have shifted from an institutional model of care to a hospitality model, where customer service and individualized care is prioritized. However, living on a virtual cruise ship is not enough to promote quality of life as personal connections and the innate need to have purpose is not addressed. In this session, attendees will learn how a focus on vocational wellness can inspire residents to use their skills and talents to give back or serve others, bolstering their feelings of self-worth.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Understand the faults of the hospitality model and opportunities it presents.
- 2. Understand the concept of Vocational Wellness and why it should be a priority when planning life enrichment programs
- 3. Have tried-and-tested ideas for Vocational Wellness Initiatives

Session 5: Deborah Smith- Legislative Update from the Government Relations Chair

Bio: Deborah Smith is the Community Life Director at Willowbrook Place, in Thiensville, WI. Deborah is an ADCP with both MC & AL Specializations. She is also CDP certified. Deborah thrives at being active both locally and on the State level. She is an active member and President of the Milwaukee Area Activity Professionals, the MAAP Regional Representative for the WRAP and the Government Relations Chair. Deborah was a 2019 WALA Inaugural HERO Award Nominee and the 2022 Activity Professional of the year Runner-up. Deborah has a positive attitude, tireless energy and is an advocate for not only the residents we serve in our communities but also for the activity professionals who work in those communities.

Session description: The main goal of the Government Relations Chair is to track regulatory information, legislative updates, and industry trends in long term care settings. Please Join Deborah as she informs conference attendees of issues, regulations, and challenges that affect our industry.

Session 8 Luke Schubert and Steve McCarthy: Ask an Administrator

Bio: Luke Schubert is a health care executive who has transformed work-team cultures and missions for over 15 years. He has led multiple strategic planning workgroups and process improvement initiatives in exceeding financial and quality goals. His experience in this industry has opened opportunities for him to acquire excellent communication, collaboration, and mentoring skills. Luke is actively pursuing a Master of Science degree in Business Administration from Rasmussen University. He is a Certified Lean Process Improvement facilitator and a licensed Wisconsin Nursing Home Administrator. In 2014, he was recognized as the Administrator of the Year by the National Association of Activities Professionals. Outside of the office, Luke enjoys golfing with his kids, coaching them in flag-football, and supporting committee fundraising for their charter school education.

Bio: **Steve McCarthy** S has worked for over 25 years in rural healthcare across Wisconsin. Started as a Physical Therapist at the VA in Milwaukee and Iron Mountain, MI and then moved into Rehab Director role at a nursing homes in Florence then Muscoda, Wisconsin. Coming from a background of family working in nursing homes, always enjoyed not only working in geriatrics, but also getting to know the patients and families. For the past 20+ years Steve has worked as Chief Operating Officer at two different Critical Access Hospitals—Dodgeville and for the last 10 years in Platteville. Both hospitals have either operated or partnered with others to run senior care services. While not an officially licensed Nursing Home Administrator, Steve has on two different occasions served as an Interim Administrator for extended periods, actually winning the State and National Activity Professional Administrator of the Year in 2006. Steve prioritizes time with staff, residents and families, routinely being involved with activities and outings. Outside of work, Steve prioritizes time with family and community. Two daughters, one a nurse in Milwaukee and the other an aspiring opera singer in North Carolina, keep him and his wife traveling regularly. As a long term member of Platteville Kiwanis Club and United Way, he leads many initiatives around community improvement projects.

Session 9 & 10 Scott Webb- Brain Trauma and Case Studies

Bio: Scott Webb is a trauma survivor himself who has worked in the behavioral health field for 37 years. His career has included clinical, administrative, and consultative work. He is currently the Trauma-Informed Care Coordinator at the State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services. He holds a Master of Science in Education degree from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

Since 2014, Scott has provided training and technical assistance on trauma-informed care principles to more than 18,000 clinicians statewide. His insights on trauma-informed care have been featured in articles published by Wisconsin Center for Investigative Journalism and Isthmus. He also has presented at numerous conferences and acted as keynote speaker for the UW-Madison School of Social Work, the National Alliance on Mental Illness Wisconsin Conference, the Wisconsin Personal Services Association, and the Wisconsin Council on Problem Gambling.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Define and identify key terminology and concepts related to trauma
- 2. Understand the significance of the Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE's) study as a public health concern.
- 3. Articulate what trauma-informed care is and identify the six principles of a trauma-informed, resilient, and compassionate work culture.
- 4. Describe the next steps to implementing trauma-informed care in the workplace.

Session 11 Amy Laughlin: Speak Up! Empowering Activity Professionals as Your Time Is Now

Session description: Building professional relationships is one of the most challenging aspects of leadership, but also one of the most rewarding. Team members who are engaged and connected with one another are likely to be much more productive, more effective, be more willing to adapt to change when necessary and have more tenure with the organization. Leaders who are engaged and connected with their team

members get more goals accomplished, spend less time "putting out fires" and are perceived as being more successful and having greater influence.

- 1. Recognize and celebrate the "essential" nature of their profession.
- 2. Understand why trust is the foundation upon which professional relationships are built.
- 3. Know when, where and how to Speak Up and when not to.
